APN PRIMER

Who We Are

The Alcohol Policy Network is an Ontario-wide network of some 1,000 people and organizations concerned about the impact of alcohol on our friends, families and communities. We are governed by a coordinating committee composed of representatives from public health, police, substance abuse prevention agencies, anti-drinking and driving groups and the community-at-large that meets regularly to exchange information on developments in alcohol

policy. APN is a project of the Ontario Public Health Association.

Our Philosophy

We believe that:

- individuals have a right to be involved in decisions that affect their health and the health of their communities.
- alcohol, although enjoyed by many, has widespread health, social and economic consequences.
- by creating a social, economic and physical environment conducive to healthy living, we can prevent or reduce

alcohol-related harm.

- by complementing harm reduction strategies with policies affecting the physical, social and economic availability of alcohol, we can promote the health and safety of all Ontarians.

Our Mission

We facilitate the development of policies that a) prevent problems associated with alcohol use; and b) enhance the health, safety and well-being of individuals and communities across Ontario.

Our Priorities

We have four priorities: 1) to provide technical support for the prevention of alcohol-related injuries; 2) to provide technical support for the reduction and prevention of alcohol-related birth defects; 3) to provide technical support for local policy development; and 4) to promote resource coordination, networking and information exchange.

What We Do

1. Information and referral

APN's primary function is to monitor and keep the field up-to-date on developments in alcohol policy in the public and private sectors. To this end, we respond to phone and email requests for information from professionals and the public-at-large on issues ranging from emerging changes to impaired driving legislation, to the latest alcohol policy research, to information on local substance abuse prevention initiatives.

2. Publications

We support local prevention efforts through a range of publications including:

- *Alcohol Policy Update*, a quarterly fax-newsletter on current developments in the field
- *Priorities, developments in alcohol policy in Ontario, 1995-96* (an updated version being compiled)
- *Communities Take Action!* (published with CAMH-ARF in March 1998)
- *Directory of Substance and Injury Prevention Contacts in Public Health* (published with the Ontario Injury Prevention Resource Centre)
- *Special Issue of Contemporary Drug Problems on Alcohol Policy & Injury Prevention* (in conjunction with the CAMH-ARF in Fall 1998)
- *Action Packs* on specific issues such as drinking and driving, alcohol advertising, alcohol liability, etc.
- *Directory of Potential Funding Sources for Injury and Substance Abuse Prevention Projects in Ontario* (September 1999).

3. Web site

APN hosts a web site called APOLNET featuring hundreds of links to research papers, resources, briefs, government bills and debates on hot issues such as privatization, alcohol taxation, impaired driving, underage drinking, municipal alcohol policy and Ontario's Low-Risk Drinking Guidelines. In May 1998, APN developed an email list of substance abuse contacts in public health to promote networking and information-sharing. We are currently looking into adding a listserv and making the site more interactive through an online forum and a networking database.

4. Teleconferences, workshops & seminars

From time to time, APN co-hosts teleconferences or workshops and seminars on topics such as liquor licensing, low-risk drinking, alcohol and youth, private alcohol delivery services, recent legislation, etc.

5. Consultation and training

In 1997, APN piloted a ½ day generic workshop and participants' package on the basics of alcohol policy called *Alcohol Policy 101*. The latter is delivered by the APN manager and Coordinating Committee members upon request. An online version is also available on APOLNET. In addition, APN provides consulting advice to professionals and organizations active in alcohol policy issues. In the past year, for example, we participated in the Manage the Energy 3 Conference Planning Committee and were active members of the Association to Reduce Alcohol Promotion in Ontario. We sat on working groups overseeing revisions to the SmartServe Server Training program and Ontario's drug education curriculum. We also provided advice to OPHA and others on the preparation of submissions related to alcohol policy, addictions services, mandatory core program guidelines, etc.

6. Partnership development and resource coordination

APN is a partner in the upcoming FOCUS Resource Centre, a virtual clearinghouse of information and assistance for FOCUS anti-drug community projects across Ontario. Over the coming months, we will also be coordinating a small group of public health practitioners and researchers looking at the links between alcohol and cancer. The committee, chaired by APN founding member and noted alcohol policy researcher Norman Giesbrecht, will be preparing a report to be considered at an upcoming policy conference hosted by the Toronto Cancer Prevention Coalition. Finally, we are working with a small group to coordinate the province-wide dissemination of the Low-Risk Drinking Guidelines.
